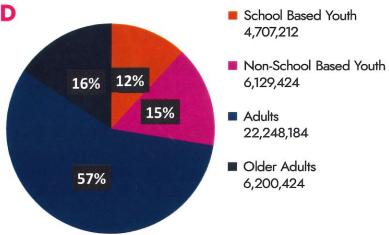
# **VETTED • ACCOUNTABLE • IMPACTFUL**

#### All 864 Arts and Culture Grants are:

- · Screened for eligibility by Department of State staff.
- · Scored and ranked by peers, subject matter experts & non arts professionals.
- · Reviewed by the Council on Arts and Culture after panel rankings.
- Required to Match Funds (from 1:1 to 10:1 depending on budget)
- · Required to Report quarterly and annually

**9:1** ROI In the recent economic impact study in partnership with Americans for the Arts, \$369 million in local and state taxes were generated as a result of this \$5.8 billion industry. The state's \$41 million in grants provided during that study period leveraged those tax revenues.

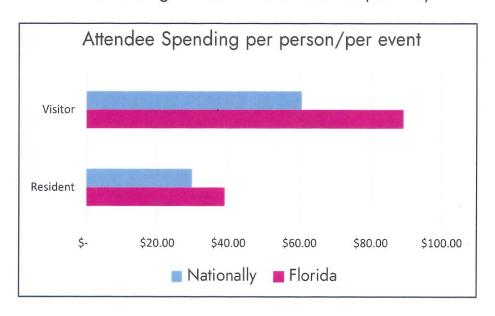
#### FLORIDA AUDIENCE SPENDING OUTPERFORMS NATIONAL AVERAGE

#### **EMPATHY, UNDERSTANDING & SOCIAL** CONNECTIONS

3% of audience members surveyed in the study said that the arts and culture helps them better understand other cultures in their community.

#### HIGHER ACHIEVING LEARNERS

High school students who have 4 years of art, dance, drama or music curriculum score higher on their SATs, have higher GPAs and are more likely to graduate.

+51pts SAT verbal +41pts SAT math

TALENTED WORKFORCE Students with an education including the arts are among the most sought after candidates for employment because of discipline, self agency and problem solving intelligence acquired in practice of their discipline. Additionally, arts discipline undergraduates rank them among the top four desired major disciplines for higher level health care degrees.

IMPROVING HEALTHCARE Nearly half of the nation's healthcare institutions provide arts programming for patients, families, and even staff. 78% deliver these programs because of their healing benefits to patients—shorter hospital stays, better pain management, and less medication.

BETTER HEALTH & WELLBEING for our military and veterans. The arts heal the mental, physical, and moral injuries of war for military service-members and Veterans, who rank the creative arts therapies in the top four (out of 40) interventions and treatments. Across the military continuum, the arts promote resilience during pre-deployment, deployment, and the reintegration of military service-members, Veterans, their families, and caregivers into communities. (two Florida grantees have been a part of the "Creative Forces" program with more anticipated in 2024.)

For our neighbors, the arts proved to be an effective resource in reducing depression and anxiety and increasing life satisfaction. Just 30 minutes of active arts activities daily can combat the ill effects of isolation and loneliness associated with COVID-19.

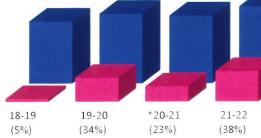
#### FLORIDA HAS A HISTORY OF FUNDING ARTS & CULTURE

Florida's Division of Arts and Culture was established over 50 years ago and enjoyed a dedicated (recurring source of funds until the year 2001. Since then appropriations have fluctuated wildly; from 100% funding of all requests in 2014 to a record low in 2019 and record high in 2023. As these programs reach farther and deeper into Florida communities, the appreciation and under-

standing of their value is growing and being reflected in the state budget.
